

**Youth Philanthropy Initiative of Indiana (YPII) conducts an annual survey with Community Foundations that promote youth philanthropy through a youth council or school-based program. Collected data is used to summarize the work and impact of youth philanthropists in Indiana communities, as well as provide insight into youth philanthropy trends.**

**Survey Participants:**

**27** Community Foundations representing **28** counties (4 school-based programs)  
**100%** response to the survey (\*not all respondents answered each question)
